Montenegro finally has a callsign prefix block. Montenegro gained independence in late June 2006 and had been using the following prefixes: 4O3, 4O6, YT3, YT6, YU3, YU6, YZ3 and YZ6. The International Telecommunications Union did not want to give the new country a new prefix and required the states of Montenegro and Serbia to agree upon one or two prefixes of the five (4N, 4O, YT, YU, YZ) from the former Serbia/Montenegro country.

On May 11th an agreement was made and the ITU now lists the 4O (Four Oscar) prefix as belonging to Montenegro. So Montenegro can use 4O0 (Four Oscar Zero) through 4O9 (Four Oscar Nine). Serbia will continue to use the YT and YU prefixes. This will include all call areas (0-9) for each.

However the 4N and YZ prefixes have been taken away and given back to the ITU for future use to another nation. This was confirmed today by a spokesman from the ITU's Radio communication Sector. When asked exactly when the two nations need to complete this change a response of "as soon as possible" was given. So there may be a short period of time to complete the switch over. DXers need to update their logging software, carefully!

QCWA, Newsline to collaborate in mentoring program: The Quarter Century Wireless Association (QCWA) <http://www.qcwa.org> and Amateur Radio Newsline (ARNewsline) <http://www.arnewline.org> have joined forces in cosponsoring the Roy Neal, K6DUE, Amateur Radio Mentoring Program. ARNewsline launched the post-licensing educational service in 2004.

It's designed to pair newcomers with veteran radio amateurs who can share their skill and experience. "Amateur Radio is a tremendously complex arena", says Newsline Executive Producer Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF. MARCONI'S STORY

I'm reading a non-fiction book that I would recommend to all hams – Thunderstruck, by Erik Larson. Although most of the public might choose it for the telling of the famous case of Dr Crippen, who murdered his wife, radio people will be fascinated by the paralleling history of the early development of the technology that brought him to justice.

The following is from the publisher:

In Thunderstruck, Erik Larson tells the interwoven stories of two men—Hawley Crippen, a very unlikely murderer, and Guglielmo Marconi, the obsessive creator of a seemingly supernatural means of communication—whose lives intersect during one of the greatest criminal chases of all time.

Set in Edwardian London and on the stormy coasts of Cornwall, Cape Cod, and Nova Scotia, Thunderstruck evokes the dynamism of those years when great shipping companies competed to build the biggest, fastest ocean liners, scientific advances dazzled the public with visions of a world transformed, and the rich outdid one another with ostentatious displays of wealth. Against this background, Marconi races against incredible odds and relentless skepticism to perfect his invention: the wireless, a prime catalyst for the emergence of the world we know today. Meanwhile, Crippen, “the kindest of men,” nearly commits the perfect crime.

With his superb narrative skills, Erik Larson guides these parallel narratives toward a relentlessly suspenseful meeting on the waters of the North Atlantic. Along the way, he tells of a sad and tragic love affair that was described on the front pages of newspapers around the world, a chief inspector who found himself strangely sympathetic to the killer and his lover, and a driven and compelling inventor who transformed the way we communicate. Thunderstruck presents a vibrant portrait of an era of séances, science, and fog, inhabited by inventors, magicians, and Scotland Yard detectives, all presided over by the amiable and fun-loving Edward VII as the world slid inevitably toward the first great war of the twentieth century. Gripping from the first page, and rich with fascinating detail about the time, the people, and the new inventions that connect and divide us, Thunderstruck is splendid narrative history from a master of the form.

I think the opening chapters on the Marconi side are especially interesting for those who have come to understand the science – because it is clear that originally Marconi did not! – and he certainly comes across as the quintessential socially-impaired nerd (with the first Black Box) to whom we have all been likened. Larson details the efforts of many of his early rivals, like Lodge, and Fleming, with bits on Hertz, Tesla, Faraday, et al.

You will enjoy the journey!

RADIO INSURANCE

Most of us will receive literature from MetLife promoting insurance. I thought I'd let you know how this works. First, let me assure you ARRL is not selling your personal information to outside organizations.

What happens is that MetLife has signed a very secure privacy agreement with ARRL that permits them, and them only, to use the mailing information we provide. MetLife is prohibited from providing it to anyone else. If they violate this contractual agreement, MetLife will suffer serious legal penalties.

Why does ARRL allow these mailings to occur? The money we get from this mailing and from any policy action resulting from it goes to support your organization. This is money we don't need to get from you members.

It is totally up to you whether you buy insurance from MetLife. It also is totally up to you whether you receive any possible future promotions such as this from additional companies. If you choose, you may opt out by advising ARRL HQ that you do not wish to have your information released for secure promotional purposes of this type.

If you choose to purchase insurance from MetLife, you will be dealing with a solid, long-established company and you will help ARRL a little, in addition. The decision is entirely yours.

Opt Out Information

Several of you are disturbed over the very controlled release of your names and addresses to MetLife so it can promote its insurance products to you at a special price. I can understand this.

It may be interesting for you to know that you could always have opted out of allowing ARRL to disclose your names and addresses even under the strict conditions the League demands of MetLife and US Bank. The information was – and is – on the ARRL web site.

Having said this, I believe the opt-out information should have been made more highly visible than it has been made. I'm sorry I had not thought of this, previously. The best I can do, at this time, is to let everyone know about it, now.

Despite their best efforts, the gang at BS7H failed to work me. I tried to give them plenty of opportunities, but they were just not up to the task. On the bright side, they did manage to put 45,000 QSOs in the log. Just not mine.

It must be disappointing for them to go all that way, endure hardship and danger, spend all the money that was going to be used to buy a new rig, and sit on a rock for hours at a time - only to be denied my QSO.

I could have tried to set up a schedule with them, but that wouldn't be fair to all the other DXpeditions that managed to work me with nothing pre-arranged.

On my side I did my best to make it easier for them. My dipole had new rope and the feed line was newly waxed. I put the full 100 watts out of the transceiver. And, to give the boys a better chance, I cranked my amp up to it's max of a full half kilowatt.

I'm sure they were concerned about the propagation between Scarborough and Maine. But, the conditions were not quite as bad as the forecasting programs made out. It certainly may have been possible to make a contact.

I bet they are thinking that if they had just brought directional antennas they might have snagged me. I know they were trying because I could hear them calling on both 30 and 20 meters. Even heard them on sideband. As you can see, I was doing everything I could to help them out.

And, it wasn't a near miss. I sat at the radio for hours (2 and a half) in case they wanted to give it a try.

I just hope they aren't too discouraged. I plan to stay here by the radio in case they want to go back and give it another try.

Plans are all set for Field Day. This is a contest to test our ability to operate in the field on emergency power and with portable antennas. The Rigs are ready and towers are borrowed. 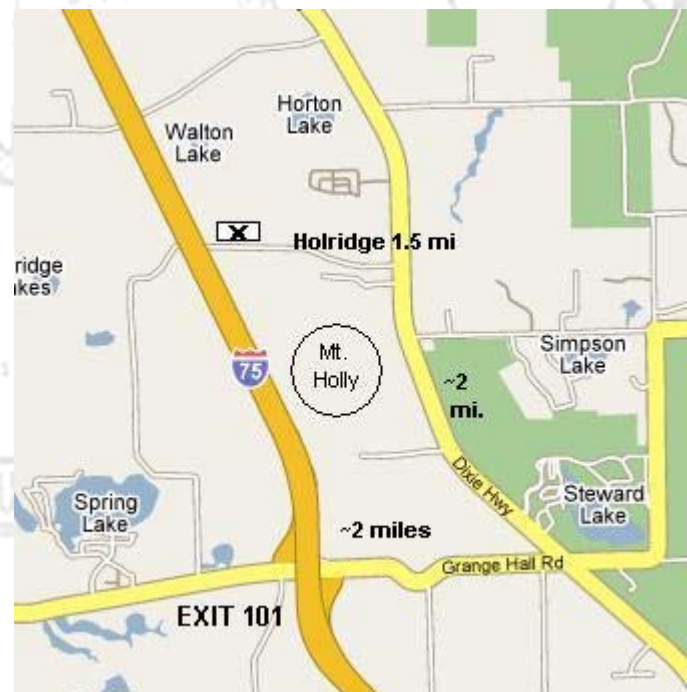

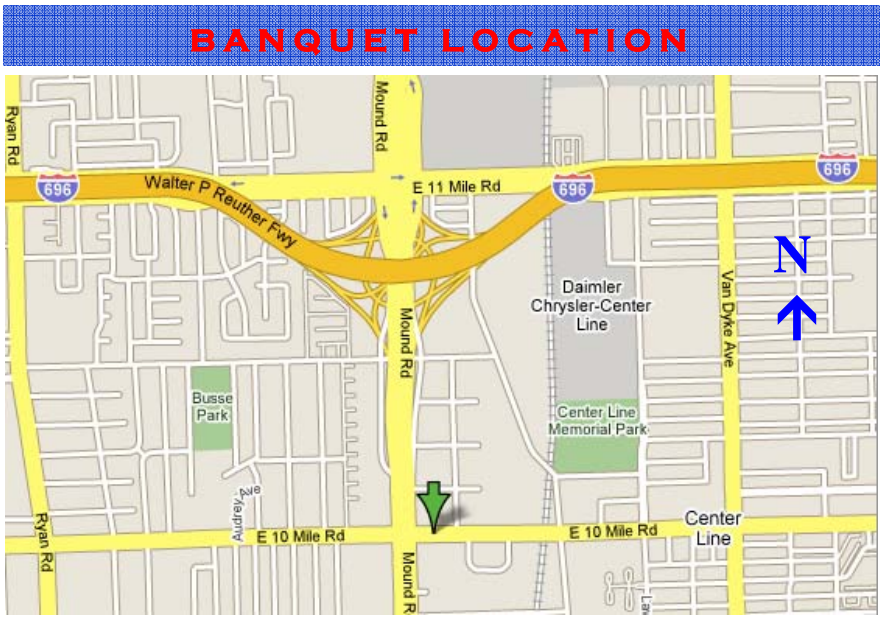
