C Q NOT SO DX. . .

Are you a Technician or General who spends all of your time on 2 meters or 440 and thinking why should I upgrade if I don't even own a HF radio yet. Well, don't let that stop you from upgrading. Take it from an old ham (26 years in ham radio). I love VHF. I am on VHF-mobile at least 5 days a week. Recently there was some discussion on 2 meters about why upgrade if you cannot afford the equipment. I would like to discuss that here.

If you are in the study mode, then go with the flow. Think of your brain as a sun spot cycle... if it's a good one, then you have to take advantage of it. Otherwise, you'll miss all the good DX (or in this case, the opportunity to upgrade when you're most receptive to taking the test).

I heard someone on the radio the other day talking about not upgrading because they do not have any HF gear. First off, let me say, please do not let that keep you from upgrading. There are many opportunities for getting on HF other than having your own radio in a spare room or basement. There is always Field Day—as well as friends and family that want to share their love of ham radio and help each other enjoy the it.

Although most of us have HF rigs in our own shacks that is not always possible. And some people with General and above license cannot have HF radios set up due to one reason or another. But ask them if regret upgrading. The answer is a resounding, "NO". They want that license ready and waiting for that one day when just the right DX station comes on the air calling CQ DX...

MEET MR. \$\$

Dear Friends, may I introduce to you—Lee W8HL our Club Treasurer [in his own words]:

As a youngster I was always interested in radio, but didn't know anyone who had anything other than AM radio. In 1980's I had a neighbor who was a ham and got me interested in getting my license. In 1989 I finally got serious about getting a license and bought a couple of tapes and a study guide. Took the test in October 1989, test got lost at the VEC and it took a call to the FCC for them to find it. In Feb 1990 I got my first call (N8LTM).

While serving in the US Navy (1960-1964) I attended Electronics A school (1961-1962) which was 28 weeks of 8 + hours of nothing, but math and electronics. I then went to Submarine school in Groton CT (1962) and then on to the USS Trigger (SS-564), (1962-1964) which was stationed in Charleston, S.C. The only trouble I had in upgrading, of course, was with the code, which took about 12 months of 15 minutes in the morning and 15 minutes at night of copying code. So in October of 1990 I received my Extra class license.

In 1996 when the vanity call program started, I applied for W8HL and got it. The H is for Harry my first name and the L is for LEE, which I use all the time. (Dad's name was Harry, not good having two Harry's in the same house.) CW never did come easy for me, so until late 2005 when on HF, I worked SSB only.

In December of 2005, I finally got my first taste of the Digital modes. Just love working PSK-31 and that is where you will find me, except during a contest or when 10 meters is open. I collect 10-10 numbers (over 1300) and am a paper chaser, with over 50 active chapters.

In February 2006 during the XE RTTY contest I got my first taste of RTTY, always heard about it but, had never tried it.

I have two grown children one each and three grandsons. Can't get them interested in the hobby, but for the youngest 6 yrs. there might still be some hope!

Presently I am using a TEN-TEC Orion as my base station radio. A Hy-Gain TH-7DX for 10-15-20 and an inverted-V for 40, 80 and 160.

USENET NOT DEAD

Some of the younger generation may think that they invented the internet, but those of us who are older and wiser know better. In fact, I remember when I first got "online" back in 1980. Granted that was not the very beginning but it was 26 years ago. My first PC was a Vic20 and I was using a tape drive and typing a word processor program from a magazine article written in Basic line by line. That is when I learned about Usenet.

You may ask, "What is Usenet?" The very brief description of what Usenet is - a set of "newsgroups" with posts, messages, articles, yes even files, shared among people over the internet with or without moderators. Well, believe it or not Usenet is alive and kicking. Yes, you can still use your favorite download tool to get newsgroup. I use Outlook Express Newsreader for some. I recently discovered Google Usenet has a mailing list feature that I can have the new messages sent to my Outlook. That works out really nice. I also go to Google to read the Usenet messages online for those that I do not want to subscribe to.

One word of warning. These are not moderated groups. You will see foul language. You will see uncouth behavior. This is the internet and not ham radio. But even me who do not think them appropriate will skim the bad messages so that I can glean the good information. I have no problem skipping 3 messages to get 1 good one.

A - 1 OPERATORS

The ARRL has a special award called A-1 Operator to honor the best in Amateur Radio. Membership comes after nomination by two Club members who find the nominee qualified to be a member of this elite group. Nominations should be based on the following:

General considerations. Transmissions stable, well filtered, and occupying the minimum required bandwidth. On voice, clarity of speech, brevity, uses appropriate words and good grammar. On digital modes, clean tones and appropriate operating-frequency selection. On CW, proper character formation and spacing with appropriate speeds (high-speed ability is not a consideration).

Procedure. Always listens before transmitting. Appropriately short CQs, avoidance of unnecessary repetition, use of proper procedures and abbreviations recommended by ARRL, avoidance of common inanities in making contacts. When operating a message forwarding system, make sure that traffic is routed to its destination.

Judgment and courtesy. Courteous, and considerate of the other operator's point of view. Takes every opportunity to assist others, especially beginners. Patient and helpful at all times, and never knowingly operates in such a way as to lessen the pleasure of others.

Copying ability. This applies to all modes, for there is a knack to passing information through such difficulties as interference from other stations (QRM), atmospheric noises (QRN), fading (QSB), etc.

The ARRL is ready to receive your nominations and issue awards. If you know someone who fits the bill, then nominate them today. Please remember that it takes two nominations for a person to be given the award so if you know someone you want to nominate, see if you can find a "second" before you send it in.
