BIRD FLU THE NEST

The Exercise Vigilant Guardian began in May with the simulation of a group of US businessmen who traveled to China and contracting the Flu. They took it back to their home base in Colorado. By July, it has spread to Michigan at which time a tabletop exercise was held involving all 3 county governments and the ARES groups. By the end of August the simulated Flu had progressed into a full blown pandemic.

On August 22, 2006 Region 2 North Hospitals covering Oakland, Macomb and St. Claire Counties organized a simulated exercise and hams from all 3 counties responded. Over 1/3 of whom were HPARC members.

This exercise was to test how successful the hospitals and Public Health system would respond to a Pandemic Flu epidemic. They followed the Medical Emergency Management System (MEMS) guidelines.

During the exercise they simulated that the 800 MHz hospital radios went down leaving amateur radio as the only form of communications. All 22 hospitals could talk to their respective EOC's via repeater and simplex. Direct inter-county message handling was successful. Traffic was successful passed during this time. The Counties were able to monitor each others frequencies.

County Emergency Management Staff, Health Department Officials, Region 2 North Hospital Administrators and ARES District 2 Management staff praised ARES volunteers for a superb job in the exercise.

Even before the event was officially over, many Hospital and EOC staff expressed their gratitude for making sure the communications went through. Which only goes to prove that once again **when all else fails** we are there.

ILLEGAL RADIO USE

The ARRL posts the FCC enforcement letters on http://www.arrl.org/news/enforcement_logs/. Some of the general population may not know that they have to have a ham license to operate a ham radio license.

If you know someone who must have proof, then you use the letter from <u>August 17, 2006</u>.

Case #EB-2006-2894 involving Oswald's Bear Ranch dated August 3rd stipulates

"Please be advised that operation without a license would be a violation of Section 301 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, 47 U.S.C. Section 301, and carries criminal penalties including monetary forfeiture (fine) and prison. Monetary forfeitures normally range from \$7,500 to \$10,000."

ARES CLASSES

The State of Michigan requires that all ARES/RACES members that are affiliated with a government agency and hold FEMA certification in IS22, IS100, IS200. These classes can be taken online. However, Oakland County will hold classes at the Pontiac EOC for those who want a hands on one-day class.

Classes will be held at the Pontiac EOC located at 1200 North Telegraph Road, Building 47 West Pontiac, Michigan, USA, 48341. The time is 9 a.m. to noon.

Classes are:

- FEMA IS100-- Saturday ,September 16
- FEMA IS22 Saturday October 14
- FEMA IS 200 --Saturday, November 14

If you have competed FEMA IS 195 you do not have to take IS100 and IS200. To register for these Fall classes, please call Loretta at the EOC at 248-858-5300

Code practice texts are from QST, and the source of each practice is given at the beginning of each practice and at the beginning of alternate speeds.

On Tuesdays and Fridays at 2230 UTC (6:30 PM ET), Keplerian Elements for active amateur satellites are sent on the regular teleprinter frequencies.

A DX bulletin replaces or is added to the regular bulletins between 0000 UTC (8 PM ET) Thursdays and 0000 UTC (8 PM ET) Fridays.

In a communications emergency, monitor W1AW for special bulletins as follows: Voice on the hour, Teleprinter at 15 minutes past the hour, and CW on the half hour.

UPGRADE TODAY

License Exam Sessions

HPARC sponsors amateur radio license examination sessions, or "VE Sessions," on a bi-monthly basis. The license exam sessions are held at **7:00 PM** in the **Oak Park Community Center**, 14300 Oak Park Boulevard, Oak

Park, MI 48237. 2006 dates are **Oct 3rd & Dec. 5th.**

Pre-registration for exams may be done by e-mail by contacting Jeff N8WR, the test coordinator at n8wr@arrl.net. Pre-registration is not mandatory but it saves time and helps us with planning.

The licensing fee is **\$14.00 per session**, no matter how many tests you successfully take (retaking failed tests requires additional fees). We prefer cash, and correct change if you have it. **Be sure to bring a picture ID** and a copy of any current CSCE's (if you don't know what a CSCE is, then you don't have one) or amateur license.

According to the new FCC Universal Licensing System (ULS), examinees will be required to bring their Social Security cards and provide their SSNs. Examinees who wish to retain the privacy of their SSNs must register with the FCC in advance to obtain registration numbers to be used instead.
