PRESIDENT'S QRM

As spring has arrived, so have many Public Service opportunities, and you all know that this includes many events that need our assistance for communication. Locally, we have the March of Dimes Walk in Troy, the MS Walk in Birmingham, the ADA Tour de Cure bike ride in Brighton and the Oak Apple Run in Royal Oak.

MISCONCEPTIONS: TECH HF PRIVILEGES

Some Technician licensees who gained new privileges February 23 remain unaware or uninformed as to what they may and may not do on the HF bands, says ARRL Regulatory Information Specialist Dan Henderson, N1ND. In addition to all Amateur Radio operating privileges above 50 MHz, Technicians who never passed a Morse code test now have CW privileges on certain segments of 80, 40 and 15 meters plus new CW, RTTY, data and SSB privileges on certain segments of 10 meters. And that's it. "Know your privileges," Henderson advises all Amateur Radio licenses. He says some Technicians apparently believe their new HF phone privileges go far beyond what they really have.

"Technicians have no phone privileges on any HF band other than 10 meters, period!" Henderson emphasizes. "That's the bottom line. If you want to operate phone on the other HF bands, you'll have to upgrade to General or Amateur Extra class."

Doing the Numbers

A lot of Technician licensees appear to have done just that, according to statistics compiled by Joe Speroni, AHOA. So far in March, the number of General class licensees is up by more than 2700 over the February figure to 134,173, after hitting a 5-year low of just under 131,000 in January. The number of Technicians dropped by 4655 in the same period to 318,838 -- although there are still far more Techs than licensees of any other class. Meanwhile, the number of Amateur Extra licensees is at a 10-year high of 109,010 -- up by more than 400 since February.

Bending the Rules

Most Technician license holders face a learning curve to take advantage of their new CW privileges on HF, but they no longer have to pass a Morse code examination. Technicians also may use their new HF privileges without having to apply for them first. No other license class automatically acquired additional privileges February 23. The "omnibus" rule changes effective last December 15 did not give Technician licensees without Morse code credit any additional privileges either.

Henderson further warns new Techs not to extrapolate additional phone privileges by misconstruing the FCC Part 97 rules to mean something they don't.

"Calls I've been getting lately indicate that some misinformed individuals believe Technicians may operate 'digital

voice' on 80, 40 and 15, where they have only CW privileges," he says. "Not true. Digital voice is really digitized voice, and it's not permitted in non-phone band segments."

Henderson reiterates that Technicians do not have FM voice privileges on 10 meters -- or on any other HF band, for that matter.

What Techs Do Have on HF

The HF privileges all Technicians now have are equivalent to those that Novice licensees have enjoyed for years, Henderson notes. "This also means the 200 W maximum power limit still applies, regardless of where you operate in the HF bands," he says. Technicians may operate at up to the legal limit on VHF and UHF, however.

On 10 meters, Technician and Novice licensees have CW, RTTY and data privileges from 28.000 to 28.300 MHz, and CW and SSB privileges from 28.300 to 28.500 MHz. "We're sorry that the sunspots aren't favoring 10 meters at this point in the sunspot cycle, but they will in a few years," Henderson allowed.

In addition, Technicians and Novices have CW -- and only CW -- privileges on from 3.525 to 3.600 MHz on 80 meters, from 7.025 to 7.125 MHz on 40 meters and 21.025 to 21.200 MHz on 15 meters.

Hearing is not Having

Hearing SSB signals doesn't necessarily mean the FCC rules permit phone operation in that segment of a band, even if a licensee may operate CW there. "Remember, just because you hear phone signals doesn't mean you have phone privileges there," Henderson said. "Not only do US operator privileges vary on HF, some regions of the world have different phone allocations than ours."

Henderson believes at least some of the confusion may have originated with a few brand-new or inexperienced Technician licensees who heard that the FCC deleted the Morse code requirement to obtain an Amateur Radio license, but paid little attention to the fine print.

"And we all know the devil's in the details," Henderson says. "Remember, the FCC requires you to know where you may and may not operate and with what modes. Stick to the privileges your license allows or risk hearing from the FCC." [source: ARRL website]

Amateur Radio activity shut down in Iraq

Iraq Amateur Radio Society (IARS) President Diya Sayah, Y11DZ, has informed ARRL that all Amateur Radio activity in Iraq has been suspended until the security situation there improves. He says the suspension affects both Iraqi citizens as well as any foreigners -- including military personnel and contractors -- who have been on the air from Iraq. The request to halt all ham radio activity and the issuance of licenses in Iraq originated with a letter from the Iraqi Ministry of Defense to Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki as part of a new security plan, Sayah said. He received subsequent confirmation via the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research to shut down ham radio activity, although he allows for a possible misunderstanding on the part of government officials as to the nature and purpose of Amateur Radio.

Titanic Special Event Stations—

Special callsign WØS will be on the air to mark the 95th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic. WØS will operate from the TITANIC Museum in Branson, Missouri starting at 8 AM local on April 14th, running through 7 PM local April 15th. The W and S in WØS stand for "White Star," the name of the shipbuilding company that build the Titanic. The Nixa Amateur Radio Club is running this one, and a UK group is also expected to take part.

D X C C C H E C K E R S

The ARRL has announced some changes in the DXCC, WAS and VUCC card checking program rules. Effective immediately, the 10-year rule has been dropped for DXCC card checking. ARRL DXCC card checkers now have been authorized to check cards for current entities only, dating back to November 15, 1945. Card checkers still may not verify cards for 160-meter contacts nor cards confirming contacts with deleted entities. In addition, DXCC card checkers now may check applications for Worked All States Award (WAS) and VHF/UHF Century Club Award (VUCC), if they agree to do so. TECH + TO GRANDPA

If you passed the Technician test before March 21, 1987, you need only provide proof to a VE team at an exam session, and you'll be given element 3 credit, and thus will be entitled to a General upgrade without testing.

If you passed the Technician test after March 21, 1987, you'll need to take the Element 3 written exam.

To get verification of your license status and exam date, write to the FCC and ask for a "Status Verification": the procedure is attached below.

Solution Description : If you do not have a copy of your old amateur license that shows when you were granted a certain operator class, you can request a verification of your license status at that time by postal mail, email, or fax.

You will be sent a letter verifying your license status, so please provide a current mailing address in your request. If you need an upgrade application submitted, you will need to contact a volunteer examiner. You will need to present a copy of your old license to show proof of passing the tests, or the amateur verification that you have received.

The MiQP offers a great opportunity just to get on the HF bands, have some fun, and represent the great State of Michigan. The organizers of this event would like to see as many Michigan stations on the air as possible. It is the activity of the Michigan stations that make this event a success. The MIQP activity has been growing each year

How about making this a club event? This type of event is what it's all about. It is a group activity that can be a source enjoyment before, during and after the event! Members could submit individual or multi-op logs under their own call and the name of your club. Hey, why not challenge another local area club or other groups or individuals within your club? The MiQP offers a great club plaque, but how about some awards within your club? Those of you that take an active part in promoting amateur radio will recognize that the MiQP is just a great opportunity to expose some of your new or potential club members to HF activity. There is nothing like getting on the air and being the center of attention because you are a Michigan station!

Sure, everyone likes to have fun, but there could also be a serious side to this event. The MIQP offers a great opportunity to practice your logistical and operational emergency communication skills. You could set up a mobile operation, a portable operation from your own or some other Michigan county, or just operate from the club or home station.

As you can see from the rules listed below, this is only a 12 hour event. Please consider getting on the air for the whole thing, or any portion of the 12 hour period. You can operate from home, portable, or mobile. With the support of mobile and portable stations, we plan on having activity in all 83 counties.

Last but not least, we ask those of you that have participated in the MIQP to please help us get the word out and encourage other Michigan hams to participate and join the fun. The name of the game is to have fun and

make Michigan "Radio Active" on April 21st. Hope to hear you on the air! See <http://www.miqp.org> for more details!

- **Date /Time:** Michigan QSO Party, sponsored by the Mad River Radio Club, from 1600Z April 21st until 0400Z April 22nd. Stations may operate the full 12 hours. (12 noon to 12 midnight local Michigan time on April 21st)
- **Modes and Categories:** Phone and CW on 80/40/20/15/10 meters. Single-op, multi-op, and mobile categories. Single-op entries are categorized by output power, QRP (5W or less), Low Power (100W or less), and High Power (greater than 100W)
- **Multipliers:** Work stations once per band and mode. Work other states and Michigan Stations. MI to MI QSO's are allowed. Work portables and mobiles again as they change county, state or province.
- **Exchange:** Exchange QSO number and location (county for MI stations, state/province or "DX" for others).
- **Scoring:** One point per phone QSO, two points per CW QSO. Count multipliers once per mode. Multipliers are MI counties for all entries, plus states & provinces for MI entries only. Final score is total QSO points times total multipliers.
- **Freqs:** Suggested frequencies: CW-3545, 7045, 14045, 21045, 28045; Phone-3800, 7200, 14250, 21300, 28450.

MIQP FOR FIRST-TIMERS

The Michigan QSO Party (MiQP) is an operating event held annually with Michigan as the center of attention. This article is a quick overview for those new to MiQP, to explain what it is and to offer encouragement to jump in and participate.

First of all, what is a "QSO party"? Over the years, this term has come to define an on-the-air operating event focusing on a particular geographic area. Amateurs inside the target area (in this case Michigan) earn points towards their QSO party score for making contacts with other amateurs located anywhere, while amateurs outside of the target area get QSO party points only for contacting amateurs inside the target area.

Perhaps the next question is: "Is the MiQP a contest?" Yes it is – the entrants are participating against one other and plaques/certificates are awarded after it is over. But don't let that scare you off - the MiQP is a lot less intense than other contests you might be familiar with, such as Sweepstakes, DX contests, or even Field Day. The bands are not as crowded as during those other events, and the operating style is a lot more relaxed. It's a great venue for a first-timer to get their feet wet.

Why might you want to participate in the MiQP? First of all, it's a great opportunity to hone your HF operating skills or work the bugs out of your HF station. MiQP can provide a concentrated dose of operating that will crack the rust off your CW ability or brush up on your phone operating techniques, skills that you can use in other on-the-air activities.

The fun thing about MiQP for Michigan amateurs is that we are the center of attention. When a Michigan station calls "CQ MIQP" there will usually be several replies. Many MiQP participants make several hundred contacts during the event, even with modest stations such as barefoot transceivers and dipoles. For many, there is a tangible feeling of camaraderie as you work fellow Michiganders, some located in sparsely populated counties with exotic names like Chippewa, Missaukee, or Presque Isle.

What does it take to participate in the MiQP? All it takes is to get on the air during the MiQP period and make contacts with other participants. When it's over, mail in your log if you like so that it can be checked and your score included in the results; you may even win a certifi-

cate or plaque. If you include your radio club's name in your entry, then your score will be tabulated along with other member's scores in a separate sub-competition to determine the top Michigan club in the MiQP that year.

When does MiQP happen? MiQP occurs the third Saturday of April every year. For 2007, the starting date for MiQP is Saturday, April 21st. The contest period begins at noon local time here in Michigan (1200 EDST or 1600Z) and runs to local midnight (2400 EDST or 0400Z on April 22nd). The contest period was deliberately chosen to be easy to fit into your weekend schedule – you can get up Saturday morning, get some chores or family activities done, and sit down for an afternoon or evening of operating.

Making MiQP QSOs is easy. You can operate on any of the "traditional" HF bands (i.e., no WARC bands) from 80 thru 10 meters. The exchange is your QSO number for that contact – i.e., the first is 001, the second 002, etc., plus your Michigan county. On CW, everyone uses the official county abbreviations from the list on the MiQP web site. Stations outside of Michigan will send their QSO number and state or province abbreviation.

Barring some sort of major propagation disturbance, you will find MiQP activity on 40M CW & SSB for the entire twelve hour contest period. This is a good band to get a mix of in-state and out-state coverage, plus it's popular with the mobile MiQP entries that move from county to county during the event. (Mobiles can be worked again when they change counties.). During the day there is usually good activity on 20M, and lesser amounts on 15M and 10M, depending on the solar cycle. Once darkness falls, there is a lot of MiQP activity on 80M.

Here's how your MiQP score is calculated. Each CW QSO is worth two QSO points while a phone QSO is worth one point. Your final score is equal to the QSO points you've accumulated multiplied by the number of multipliers (Michigan counties, non-Michigan states and Canadian provinces) you work. Multipliers are counted separately on **both** CW and phone. For example, if you work Washtenaw County (WASH) on both CW and phone, that's two multipliers.

As you start out in MiQP you might just want to make

QSOs and have fun, but here are some suggestions to keep in mind which should increase your score. A station may be worked once on both CW and phone on each band, so try all five bands (and both CW and phone) to look for MiQP QSOs. The lower bands (80M & 40M) are usually better for in-state QSOs, and out-state QSOs out to 500 miles or so, but try the high bands (particularly 20M) to bolster your score with US states and Canadian provinces from out west. Also, while most people probably have a preferred mode they like to operate, because state and province multipliers are counted separately on CW and phone, in MiQP it's worth the effort to spend some time on the "other" mode to build up the multiplier count for a good score.

When MiQP is over, you have thirty days to submit your entry in order for it to count in the final results. (Note: If you make MiQP QSOs but don't send in a log, no harm is done; the people you worked still get credit for your QSO(s) with them.) Paper logs can be sent to: **Mad River Radio Club, c/o Dave Pruett, 2727 Harris Road, Ypsilanti, MI 48198.** Electronic log files (ASCII text only) can be e-mailed to LOGS@miqp.org.

What can you win for participating in MiQP? The Michigan winner in each majority category receives a beautiful 10" x 13" plaque, a total of eleven in all. The top single-operator score in each Michigan county making at least 50 QSOs wins a handsome certificate.

WASHINGTON - The cost of mailing a letter will go up on May 14, but you'll be able to lock in that price no matter how rates rise in the future by buying the new "forever" stamp.

The post office governing board agreed Monday to accept the new 41-cent rate for first class mail recommended in February by the independent Postal Regulatory Commission.

The board also agreed to the proposal for a "forever stamp," that will always be valid for mailing a letter no matter how much rates increase.

James C. Miller III, chairman of the postal board, said the forever stamp could go on sale as soon as next month, at the 41-cent rate.

- Letters, bill payments, greeting cards: 41 cents for the first ounce, up from 39 cents.
- Wedding invitation (2-ounces), 58 cents, down from 63 cents.
- Postcard, 26 cents, up from 24 cents.
- Priority mail flat-rate envelope, \$4.60, up from \$4.05.
- Express Mail flat-rate envelope, \$16.25, up from \$14.40.
- Parcel Post, 1-pound package, \$4.50, up from 3.95.
- Bank statement, 2 ounces, presorted, 45.9 cents, down from 54.4 cents.
- Utility bill, barcoded, 31.2 cents, up from 29.3 cents.

FCC licensed amateurs may operate the station from 1400 UTC to 1600 UTC (10 AM to 12 PM ET), and then from 1700 UTC to 1945 UTC (1 PM to 3:45 PM ET) Monday through Friday. Be sure to bring your current FCC amateur radio license or a photocopy.

\$ 3 TO GERMANY

You may have noticed that some German QSL managers are driving to the Czech Republic to mail their QSL cards. One example is DK8YY.

The reason may very well be that they are only getting \$2 in the QSL requests. The Cost to mail QSL cards outside Europe has gone up to \$3 US. This may be one reason to stock up on some IRC's.

I R C S vs. G S S

It has been a long standing tradition that the sender pays for the return postage in whatever form requested. Period. A debate exists as to whether one can send IRCs when they are told to send GS. This debate may never be resolved, however the end result is: if you want someone's card you need to follow their request exactly. Some ask for IRC's only—others ask for GS only—yet others do not care. If someone's QSL requirements bother you, then do not send for the QSL card. Your other options are work a different ham from that country or send the card via the Buro or LOTW.

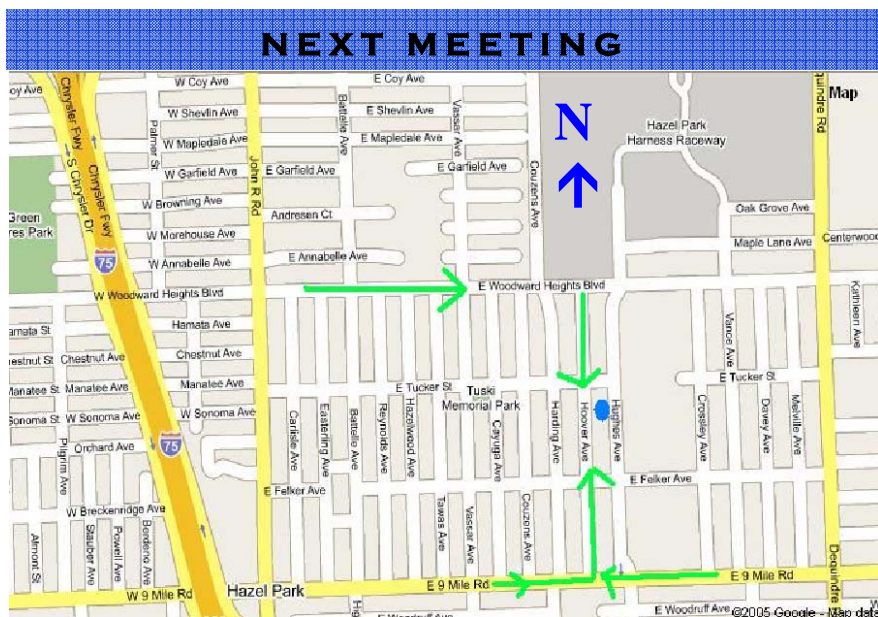
