The US Postal Service, beset by funding problems, is cutting back on services. Latest casualty: the venerable International Reply Coupon. While most DX stations accept "green stamps" (dollar bills) for QSL postage, some still insist on IRCs. How this will change is anyone's guess.

USPS says the demand just isn't there to justify further sales of IRCs. If the post office gets its way, it could stop selling IRCs as soon as the end of January. Existing IRCs would still be good to their expiration date, and American hams could still convert IRCs received to postage, though.

LOTW PROBLEMS

Hams using Logbook of the World (LOTW) noticed on November 4 that it was not working. The ARRL said it was "down for maintenance" for 3-1/2 days. When service resumed on November 8, it recovered slowly. The large number of delayed log submissions, in part from the SSB Sweepstakes and the CQ WWDX CW contest, caused a backlog. Several days would elapse until submitted QSOs were available on LOTW.

Then a few amateurs noticed something else: their submissions didn't get processed by LOTW at all. This led ARRL to discover a bug. When the backlog got too large, some files were silently dropped. A fix was put in place on November 28. ARRL reports it is working.

Where does that leave LOTW users? No data in LOTW's database was lost. However, users should double-check that all their QSOs made it in. The culprit? For the outage, ARRL hasn't said. For dropped submissions, it's a question of capacity. When writing the program, ARRL expected hams to submit logs every week or every month. Instead, some loggers send in data daily or more often. So LOTW ran out of capacity, pure and simple. At the end of November, the backlog was still reported as a few days.

HUNTING THE ANTARCTIC QSO

One night at the end of March, tuning across a dead 20 meter band, I heard KC4AAA coming in weak but clear, holding two-minute QSOs North America. I was fascinated. This was my introduction to Antarctic DX.

Antarctica is not particularly rare, but nothing about
Antarctica is simple or easy. This article may help Michiganders make contact with the frozen continent. Maybe it'll help me, too, since Antarctic QSOs have eluded me so far.
Here are some things to take into account.

Geography

Most of the Antarctica lies south of the Antarctic Circle at $66\,^\circ\text{S}$, while the region defined by the Antarctic Treaty covers $60\,^\circ\text{S}$ to the Pole. Distances from Hazel Park are 7,500 to 11,000 miles, with beam headings ranging from $170\,^\circ$ to $210\,^\circ$.

New Zealand and Australia are comparable DX. Good signals from Down Under are rare in my shack. Maybe that's a hint about how hard Antarctica will be to reach.

Rarity

Historically, amateurs provided communication links to the outside world. Now, due to satellite phones and internet links, most amateur operation is recreational.

In the austral summer, November to March, about 40 callsigns are on the air. In other months, that number shrinks to perhaps 20.

Some awards include the "peri-Antarctic" region, starting at 50°S. This adds more islands and Tierra del Fuego. One can work someone in the tourist town of Ushaia, Argentina,

for Antarctic award credit. Ships operating /MM in the region count, too.

Finding Stations on the Air


Antarctica hams use many prefixes. Home countries license individuals and "club" stations. Since people come for the summer months or one-year tours, many callsigns are different from year to year.

Since there are no spare people on most Antarctic crews, work can crop up at almost any time. Radio operation happens when hams can grab a spare hour or two.

The usual DX news outlets carry few announcements of Antarctic stations. Better sources are the news page and the *WAP Bulletin*, available at www.waponline.it. This site and newsletter collect reports and QRV announcements, often from Antarctic ops themselves. Operators use CW, SSB and various digital modes. DX clusters are not too useful except for spotting specific callsigns, because of the diversity in callsigns.

Listening at specific times and frequencies is a good strategy. Here are suggested frequencies from the WAP

Propagation

Propagation to Antarctica is hit or miss. I have not found any sources for published forecasts. Antarctic stations use 20, 30 and 40 meters most, though there's activity on all bands 6 through 160 meters. While a "big gun" DX setup helps make contacts, hams with modest rigs and antennas can QSO when propagation is good.

The best times to listen for Antarctica seem to be late afternoon into evening on 20 meters, when the band goes long, and after dark on 30 and 40 meters. Remember that in austral summer the Antarctic station is always in sunlight. In summer, the aurora does not seem to be a big factor in propagation.

Confirmation

QSLing presents another challenge. People who go to Antarctica tend to be busy and adventurous. Getting logs to a QSL manager is not their highest priority.

At KC4AAA, KC4AAC and KC4USV, the three American bases, hams normally use the base callsign and QSL via K1IED. However, there is no centralized logging. Each ham keeps his own log that he may or may not send to the manager. One suggestion is to ask such operators for their home calls, so that the QSL manager can find a record of the QSO more easily.

American hams operating /KC4 and hams from other countries QSL through managers or directly after they return home. Good sources for QSL information are QRZ.com and waponline.it.

Regular Awards

DXCC entities in the Antarctic region are: Antarctica (CE9), Peter I Is (3Y), South Orkney Is (LU#Z), South Shetland Is (LU#Z)

South of 50°S, add:

Kerguelen Is (FT#X), Auckland & Campbell Is (ZL9), Falkland Is (VP8), Heard Is (VK0), Bouvet (3Y), Macquarie Is (VK0), South Georgia Is (VP8), South Sandwich Is (VP8), Tierra del Fuego Prov., Argentina (LU#XP-XZ), Magellanes Region, Chile (CE8)

(Argentinian and French callsigns do not use the number to designate a district or area.)

According to N1CL of the ARRL Awards Branch, Antarctica can be counted as a continent for Worked All Continents if one of the others is missing.

Antarctic Awards

Awards come from three main groups. The Worldwide Antarctic Program offers the WACA and WADA awards.

Mediterraneo DX Club has the Antarctic Award. All three require ten confirmed QSOs based on different callsigns or different regions of the continent. The French Polar Team offers the Antarctic Challenge. This last award is unusual in that any number of contacts qualify.

Activity Week

February 18-24 is the tenth annual Antarctic Activity Week. This event celebrates amateur activity in Antarctica. Special event stations are active around the world. These special stations can be worked for a certificate. Keep in mind, though, that most of them are *not* in Antarctica. True Antarctic stations may be more active than usual, since by that week the summer season is winding down for many scientists and technicians.
