over the radio. So you will need a 2-meter radio that can tune to the net control frequency, which is usually 147.520, but may be some other nearby frequency. And you will need a method to keep the radio powered for at least three hours or more.

Additional details will be provided by Mike in the near future. This is a good opportunity for new members to help out and get to hear the club in action, while gaining some good experience.

May is election month for the HPARC, and it will be interesting to see who the election candidate search team has selected. They have not told me who my opponent will be in the election so that I can start writing my campaign speech. It is not to late to let them know you want to be a candidate and have the chance to help run the club.

This has not been the very happiest time for some of us, though. In March we lost a member, Ralph, KA8YOH, and then in April I lost a friend, Jim, W8WAO, who I believe was a member of the USECA club. You may not have known Jim, but he had been a member of the Rocking Chair net for guite a few years. Then we lost another ham, who had been a member for many years, Bill, N8HFM. Unfortunately I did not get any information about his memorial service until after it had been held. One thing that I did find quite disturbing about Jim's passing was that when I mentioned to his wife that when the time came to sell his ham equipment I would be willing to help her set prices on it, she explained that somebody had purchased the entire collection two days after he died. Not for a whole lot of money either. What sort of vulture would do something like that? Then, making the thing even worse, I remembered this past week that I had loaned Jim a small oscilloscope to monitor his modulation with. That scope was part of what was already gone. I suppose that it should have had my name and call on it someplace, along with a note that it was only being loaned, but I did not think about that at the time. Perhaps if other club members have equipment loaned out they may choose to add some label to avoid this happening to them. I would recommend that.




SOME SPRING ANTENNA PROJECTS

With warm weather finally here, it's time to get outdoors and work on antennas! The existing ones can get cleaned, tightened and perhaps retuned. There's always room for one more antenna, though. Here's a roundup of five projects that caught my eye.

40 Meter Vertical

Getting the nice, low radiation angle of a vertical antenna need not involve lots of aluminum and a thousand feet of buried radials. Al Brogdon W1AB built what he called "A Simple Killer Antenna," published in the June 1999 issue of QST. The idea is simple: get a rope over a tree branch at least 45 feet up, then haul up a 33 foot vertical wire. The antenna is completed by three 33-foot horizontal radials as a counterpoise, tied off well above ground level. Al used 450-ohm ladder line and an antenna tuner to feed the vertical; it could be improved with a matching circuit at the base of the antenna.

Two-Band Folded Dipoles

Joel Hallas W1ZR found a good use for 450-ohm ladder line: two-band antennas. As shown in the diagram, the lower wire and the outer parts of the upper wire serve as a partially folded dipole on the lower band. The center section of the upper wire acts as a parasitic radiating element on the higher band. Because the antenna is folded, the antenna is shorter than a simple wire dipole. In his first QST article, Joel shows a 40/20 meter dipole only 56 feet long. Response to this idea prompted him to write a second article with dimensions for other bands. An 80/40 meter dipole built this way measures only 111 feet, while 17/12 and 15/10 are 24 feet and 20 feet respectively.

Both articles (and a correction) were published in QST and have "Skeleton Sleeve" in their titles. ARRL members can retrieve them and the vertical article by going to http://www.arrl.org/qst, then searching the "print archive" for title keywords.


Homebrew Buddistick

Budd Drummond W3FF invented the Buddipole family of portable antennas. What may surprise people is that he has published plans for homebrew versions. A good antenna for setting up anywhere is the Buddistick, a 10 foot loaded vertical with a single wire counterpoise. In different configurations, it covers 10 to 60 meters. The counterpoise coils up on a kite string winder for storage. Budd recommends using a fiberglass painter's pole as a collapsible mast under the antenna. Full details can be found by going to

Above: homebrew Buddistick. Illustration courtesy W3FF, reprinted by permission




Phil AD5X holding his vertical antenna in collapsed form, ready for storage. Photo courtesy AD5X, reprinted by permission.

Collapsible Vertical

How about a multiband vertical that collapses for easy transport? Phil Salas AD5X devised a 15-foot vertical that collapses into 20-inch pieces, small enough to haul around in a bag. Building the antenna requires working

with brass rod and fittings. When finished, it features a built-in lawn spike and a matching section for a 50-ohm feed. Phil operates the antenna with six 15-foot radials he just lays on the ground. For details look at

Collapsible Tripod

Marsha N8FE recommends this tripod base from Down Under, by David Tavener VK4ICE. The tripod allows portable operation of a mobile antenna raised about three feet off the ground. It's built using aluminum flat and angle bar stock and brass door hinges. The assembly collapses into a bundle three feet long. The legs are held in their folded position by Velcro dots. There's a little bit of metalworking needed for the center mounting plate. In use, the legs of the tripod are staked into the ground for stability. David claims no radials or counterpoises are needed, but also has not tried using ground radials. Plans can be found at

While all of these look intriguing, my first choice will be to use up some of that open wire line bought at hamfests, getting a signal out on 17 and 12 meters. These "WARC" bands are promising — lots of DX, no contests, and a more relaxed pace than 20.

Beam Headings: North Jersey DX Assn, http://www.njdxa.org/dx-tools/beam-headings.php. From southeast Michigan, 3A Monaco should have a short path heading of about 54 degrees, and 3D2 Fiji 263 degrees.


