He was happy of the money he saved by reloading, and I did learn about the need for consistency in order to be accurate. I found that interesting.

Bruce did not talk about his job, which was creating software and making it work correctly. My guess is that it was proprietary and not to be discussed with anybody.

About a year ago I stopped seeing Bruce at the meetings, and when I checked I found that his health had deteriorated quite a bit. He had cancer and a number of complications. The last time we talked he told me that he wanted to donate some equipment to the club, but not while he was still going to be using it. Bruce was both generous and wise like that all the time that I knew him. His wish was granted and he did donate his equipment to the club. I thank both Bruce and his daughter Suzette for the generous donation.

His funeral and interment were on March 24, at Christ Church Cranbrook. The whole club was invited, I was the only one who came.

BUNCH OF QRP

Cheap APRS that works? With a Chinese radio? Ok y'all, as you know – I like APRS. How many of you have a Kenwood D72 or D710? How many have a Yaesu 350 or 400? How many are actually using the APRS function on them? Q equals almost Zero here, for shame. You want new hams to get involved in Ham Radio then give them new uses for classic modes. Makers send APRS equipped balloons around the world seems to be the current rage.

Too often the problem is that equipment is simply too expensive, especially for new hams or people who wish to try something out without a full investment! THAT is why these new Chinese radios have become such a hit. Just like the Raspberry Pi – A paperboy can now set up his own "Whatever!"

So far, in the crowd I work with – the Baofeng UV-5R has been the most stable and reliable radio for spare usages, hacking, or for loaning out to new projects. IT is easily and reliably programmed with Chirp in Linux, Windows, and Mac. So that it is a very universal RaspberryPi of Radios.

I was very happy then, to hear that Baofeng was finally going to produce a cable for connecting my 5R's to an Android phone and run APRSDroid. In fact, it allows the 5R to work with almost ANY Android audio-based Ham Radio software.

It was simply enough to connect this cable to my 5R and Android phone, setup APRSDroid and run APRSDroid using the Audio-Modem-mode. But then I decided to use a Speak-Mic-Splitter and plug this cable into my laptop. I was then able to use APRS-IS and APRSPoint to get on the APRS network while mobile with my laptop. You will need to use programs which incorporate an Audio Modem or run a program which creates one.

So, if you wanted to try a solution such as this – Get the cable and see what you can do for your own projects.

GREAT LAKES HAMCON

On the Monday following the canceled HPARC meeting, Larry Camp WB8R, ARRL Michigan Section Manager, gave a presentation on Great Lakes HamCon at the USECA meeting instead. Larry gave the audience a lot of information. Here are some highlights.

GLHC will take place October 7 and 8 at the Michigan International Speedway in Brooklyn, near Jackson and about 2 hours from Hazel Park. Tickets will be \$17 in advance, \$20 at the gate, available online starting in April. Flea market spaces will run \$40. There will be plenty of paved parking. Camping/RV spaces will be available on the MIS property.

The event will be located on the infield of the MIS 2-mile oval track. No, we won't be able to get out onto the racetrack itself. Attendees will walk on pavement the whole time. There are three large buildings for indoor exhibitors, and several buildings along the pit road for forums and gatherings. The 1,650 foot long pit road will be used for the flea market, withcapacity for at least 300 spaces. MIS will provide parking, food service and security.

GLHC will also be the 2017 ARRL Great Lakes Division Convention.

The idea for GLHC started last July when MIS approached Larry Camp about holding a ham radio convention at the speedway. Larry and a few others put together the Great Lakes Amateur Radio Association as the ham sponsor of the event. GLARA is a nonprofit "council of clubs," with 14 members from around southern Michigan so far. The Livonia and South Lyon clubs are already members. Larry came to the Detroit area in part to recruit more clubs to join.

GLARA chose a date with no hamfests within two weeks in an area stretching from western Pennsylvania to southern Wisconsin.

My impression is that GLHC intends to become a regional hamfest much like, say, Orlando Hamcation. The Dayton Hamvention draws about 25,000 attendees. Monroe, the largest hamfest in Michigan, draws about 1,000. According to Dave, projections for the first year of GLHC are a crowd of 3,000 to 5,000 across the two days. MIS has made a

The Zero Beat Editor is a non-voting but participating member of the Board and asked to attend the Board meetings.

Banquet Chair: Installation of Officers and Awards Dinner is the Second Wednesday of June. The Board overwhelming voted in favor of a change of venue. We usually get about 50 people although with a good venue and food we could get more. Cash bar optional but desirable.

Coming up soon is the Michigan QSO Party contest. It runs from noon to midnight EDT on Saturday, April 15, 80 to 10 meters phone and CW. This is a fun contest where, unlike other contests, everyone wants to call *you*.

The rules are pretty simple. For every contact, you give a serial number and your Michigan county. The other station gives you the same, or his state or province if not in Michigan. You can contact a station once on each band and mode. Best bands are 20 and 40 meters in daylight, then 40 and 80 meters after dark.

FEBRUARY MEETING MINUTES

Meeting called to order at 7:30pm by President, JD KD8VXZ.

Pledge of allegiance said.

No license upgrades.

Introductions were made.

Presentation by Ken AD8M on antenna system design, with concentration on optimizing feedline lengths for the frequency being used.

Break with coffee and donuts.

Report on swap from Hugh KE8BED: More tables were sold than last year, 99 sold. There were some no-shows, but we did a little better than last year, and some things being planned for next year. Thanks to Les AA8UU and Ken AD8M for help passing out fliers and emailing vendors. JD announced that we are creating a swap interest group to make future swaps even better. JD Thanked Hugh for all his work organizing the swap.

Bob N8REL treasurer's report- We did well, income just over \$3,400 with expenses about \$1,650, profit around \$1,750, with some checks still coming in. We had a pretty good month, but some additional expenses, totaling \$2,895 – among them: late expenses from banquet last year, website hosting, insurance, and other things.

Jerry W9NPI VE report. Exam sessions at swap- 6 people took exams: 2 didn't pass, 2 new technicians, 1 general upgrade and 1 extra upgrade. Jerry is circulating info about classes in the fall.

4 People tested last night at the Oak Park Recreation Center, 2 new techs, 1 general upgrade, and 1 extra upgrade.

JD KD8VXZ — Motion to discuss expense of new Fusion Repeater for the UHF site, under the \$600 purchase program that we got the VHF repeater.

Discussion — Sean K8KHZ There are 3 common digital systems; Fusion would tie to Yaesu equipment. Do we want to tie down to that standard?

Aaron W8VIP — Can we plan on adding a card to add DSTAR support to the repeater? Murray KE8UM- We can't have card in addition to the regular controller, with the currently available setup. Fusion repeater deal is back on at \$600, but to use the controller we would also need a \$100 module. There is an audio problem with the existing repeater; it was repaired from a power surge but still doesn't work perfectly.

Jerry N8UUF — Are people even using the 440 repeater? Lots of dead air heard

W8MJC — What is it? Murray KE8UM — it is an older commercial Vertex unit.

W8MJC — GM club contemplating same upgrade but decided to wait for the next model.

(Further discussion on this between various members)

Wes AC8JF — What is the overall plan for DART? Today we have wide-coverage analog (i.e. remote receivers) and narrow-coverage digital on VHF.

Murray KE8UM — Want to replace it, Fusion is not the goal, just side effect. A power surge damaged it years ago and it was repaired and ever since the audio has been not so good. The DR2 is coming soon and will have a better controller, but it is not available yet and likely will be more expensive.

Vote: Nays have it, we will not buy the repeater now. Marsha N8FE- First weekend in march has siren test Saturday 1pm. We need volunteers to report whether sirens are working, some people have signed up, but we need more. See the article in the Zero Beat.

JD KD8VXZ said that when he told people that HPARC does the siren test they thanked us for doing it. Meeting closed 8:55


