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GENERAL MEETING

The next meeting of the Hazel Park Amateur Radio Club will be held Wednesday, November 8, at 7:30 PM. Socializing starts around 7:00 PM. A HOMEBREW FAN DIPOLE

Here is how to build a home-brew multiband antenna using no traps, the fan dipole.

A fan dipole is actually 3 wire dipoles all fed with a common coax line. Once properly tuned this antenna offers the advantage of 3 resonant antennas covering 40, 20 and 10 meters without the use of an antenna tuner. 15 meters is a direct harmonic of 40 meters and thus that band operates very well with any transmitter with an internal antenna tuner, as do 12 meters and 17 meters.

I built my first fan dipole in 2003 usinf solid copper wire. Unfortunately it stretched in the wind over the years forcing me to build one with copper clad. That one has stood the test of time.

Each time I built one, I had help from other hams who also wanted to build their own. Reciprocating their help I gained construction experience and improved my methods. Each ham who hung their fan dipole returned with comments, probably biased, that they loved its performance and the simplicity of jumping bands without tuning. By the way, for contests this is the way go because the bandwidth is so broad. As you approach the edge of the band the SWR will rise but not above 3:1. A transmitter's internal antenna tuner will easily bring the SWR to 1:1.5.

To be fair, I should mention the downside. Well, there is no electrical downside, but mechanically this antenna offers some challenges. It is a clumsy antenna to work with on the ground, snarling and crossing lines. It is also a difficult antenna to transport. Take my recommendation: build it on site.

Once the antenna is flying it displays aesthetic character and well outperforms multi band antennas which necessitate an extra tuner.

MATERIALS:

Many places carry #16 AWG copper-clad wire. I order online. One site with good prices is The Wireman, item #504.

Fiberglass "snow sticks" are required. They come in two colors, yellow and orange. I suggest yellow for stealth.

The cord mentioned is just basic parachute cord, available from Joe's Army Navy Surplus on Woodward Ave. in Royal Oak.

FAN DIPOLE, CONT'D

CONSTRUCTION:

Rather than working on the ground, put up 2 supports about 8 to 10 feet high and string a strong and very tight rope between them. I suggest 10 foot 2x4's and a rope.

Hang the Balun in the middle.

String the 40 Meter wires first. Do both sides and leave some extra for tuning.

Install Supports A,B X,Y and Z. String the 20 Meter wires followed by the 10 Meter. Make up the distance from the end insulators to the supports with cord.

Tune the 40 meter dipole first, followed by the 20 meter, and the 10 meter last.

Tuning can be done from the temporary hanging position. It is best to tune near the center of the band or near your operation preferences. To lengthen the antenna the pigtail can be folded back over the insulator in line with the antenna.


Prior to hanging the antenna at full height, remove the overhead rope and support for the balun.


NOTE:

A. Drill holes in the fiberglass snow sticks for #14 AWG wire to slide through. Mark and drill where needed. As the span grows larger the dimensions will change.

B. Slip bare #14 copper wire through the holes and wrap around the dipole wires to secure in place.

Once in position, they can be soldered if so desired.

Mike McClain AB8ZE moved to accept the new logo, John Little W8TOY seconded. Motion was approved.


