The Last Annual HT Golf Outing

The rest of us we were undaunted, and thirteen souls braved the elements, fought a pitched battle with club and cart, and finally brought the course to its knees. Well, the course was already wobbling when we arrived, as it was evident that the grounds keepers have had a problem growing grass on the fairways. Winter Rules were declared and we were off.

Imagine the honor bestowed upon our select group, being the first golfers to tee off that morning under absolutely clear skies and a postcard-quality sunrise. Team 4, at full foursome strength with Jim KE8QT, Tony WD7G, "RJ" WB8HBJ and Ed KA8NCH, posted a seven over par score. We should explain that they did start last, and doubtlessly were in the final stages of dehydration as the heat took its toll.

All were enjoying the day and relaxing when the HPARC Golf Commissioner Frank AA8JN checked into the radio festivities at the ninth hole, declared that he had missed the start and asked to review the instant replays. Phone is 2 weeks later from Nov. 18, to Nov. 20, 1995, using the same times.

All bands except WARC bands are legal, and don't worry, there are sections of the Novice-Tech bands where slow speed will be sent. One other restriction has been placed on the contest; you are only allowed to operate 24 of the 30 hours of the contest.

This contest is the perfect time to upgrade your CW speed by working on the air. It also gives you the chance to Work All States in one fell swoop.

The Challenge

No one has beaten our Leader, Mike WD8S for Most Contacts in quite a while. He has said "Catch me if you can", so let's take it away from him.

The Invitation
