MHO AND SOLAR FLARES

Tom Hagen, NE9Y, will be the presenter for October. He is secretary of the McMath-Hulbert Astronomical Society. He will tell us about the McMath-Hulbert Solar Observatory ("MHO") and "Solar Flares and Their Effect on Amateur Radio" He will also be discussing a little about the history of MHO including a little about the K8MHO ham radio station. In the 1950's when U.of M. owned it, they did research on solar flares using signals received on the Hallicrafters SX-88 (tuned at 18MHz) and the "SEA" (Sudden Enhancement of Atmospherics") VLF receiver (tuned around 24-30 KHz). This continued well into the 1970's. Signal levels were integrated and plotted on one chart recorder and provided an indication of solar activity.

YOSQP

By now, most of the readers should have gotten the October issue of QST with its focus on Radiosport. There are three feature articles and an eight-page "pullout" section of resources and references, in addition to the regular editorial content. This is a nice vote of confidence for contesting as an activity that encourages operating and the advancement of one's personal skills and station capabilities. Is the ARRL trying "kill off contesting"—a comment heard now and then? I don't think so.

In the pullout is an announcement of the Year Of the State QSO Party during 2009. There is a nice certificate that can be downloaded and soon there will be another image for a sheet of self-adhesive labels to be printed with all of the 50 state flags. These stickers can be affixed to the certificate when each state is worked during its QSO party, either by state or region. For those states without a QSO party, a contact during an ARRL contest will suffice.

As of this issue, there are a few states for which no QSO Party exists: North and South Dakota, New York(!), lowa, Alaska, and Kansas. Would your club like to sponsor a QSO Party for your state just this one time? Perhaps the sponsors of a neighboring state might want to run a "two-stater" this year, or make a state QSO Party into a Regional QSO Party. If you do decide to do so, let your editor or ARRL Contest Branch Manager Sean Kutzko KX9X know so that we can let everybody know. We can also put you in touch with other similar sponsors for advice on rules and log handling. Remember that the deadline for your contest to make the QST version of Contest Corral is two months prior to the month of the contest. (i.e. - for a September contest, the deadline for QST to receive information is 1 July)

What is the point of the YOSQP? It's to introduce more hams, particularly those new to HF, to contesting in a low-key and casual way and give them a nice incentive, to boot. Careful readers of the award rules will note that it is a requirement to not only make the contact, but to send in a log to the contest sponsors. We hope this little exercise will also encourage these same operators to get involved with "the majors" and send in a log there, too. Along the way, they'll find that contesting is fun and submitting a score is not difficult.

And you Big Gun veterans out there--this should be fun



Space Weather News for Sept. 22, 2008

NEW SUNSPOT: For the first time in months, a significant sunspot is emerging on the sun. It is a fast-growing active region with two dark cores, each larger than

Earth. The magnetic polarity of the sunspot identifies it as a member of new Sunspot Cycle 24. Because the year 2008 has brought so many blank suns, some observers have wondered if we are ever going to climb out of the ongoing deep solar minimum.

Today's new sunspot is an encouraging sign that the 11-year solar cycle is indeed progressing, albeit slowly. Visit http://spaceweather.com for sunspot photos and updates.

ARRL AUCTION

The Third Annual ARRL On-Line Auction kicks off October 23, running until October 31 on the ARRL Web site.

This is your chance to pick up one-of-a-kind Amateur Radio items. To see what the Auction will offer this year, be sure to check out the Auction preview that begins October 16.

Last year, the Auction attracted more than 3000 registered bidders from more than 40 countries. While the majority of buyers were from the USA, Canada and the UK, there were buyers from Australia, Malaysia, Grenada, Vietnam and Tanzania.

According to ARRL Chief Operating Officer Harold Kramer, WJ1B, "Last year's on-line auction – our second – proved to be a successful and enjoyable event for both hams and ARRL staff members alike. When the bidding ended, we realized that we had sold 162 items and raised just over \$50,000." Proceeds from the auction benefit ARRL education programs including activities to license new hams, strengthen Amateur Radio's emergency service training, offer continuing technical and operating education, as well as creating instructional materials.

ARRL Business Services Manager Deb Jahnke, K1DAJ, encouraged everyone to come and peruse the wide variety of offerings: "Browse through the Web site frequently, as items will be added on a daily basis. We also encourage you to look through the 'Help' and 'About Us' sections. You'll find useful information about bidding, FAQs and a host of other facts. To ensure an enjoyable experience, please be sure to read all policies in the 'About Us' section."

This year's auction will again include many transceivers and other items that have appeared in the QST Product Review column and have thus been thoroughly tested by the ARRL Lab. There will be many vintage items offered, as well. Also, returning by popular demand will be four ARRL Lab unique "junque" boxes. These boxes have a starting bid of \$50 and have almost anything you could ever possibly imagine in them. No one – except the ARRL Lab staff – knows what exactly is inside each box, but each is guaranteed to be full of things that the Lab staff consider valuable (but keep in mind that they collect just about anything).

Jahnke said that due to many requests last year, "all product review items in the On-Line Auction include a link to a PDF file of the actual Product Review, as well as a reference to the QST issue that the review appeared in."

Bangladesh Radio Licensing Begin Again

Amateur Radio Exams, Licensing Return to Bangladesh Since 2004, Amateur Radio operators in Bangladesh have not been able to get an Amateur Radio license or sit for an examination. But thanks to the efforts of the Bangladesh Amateur Radio League (BARL) — that country's IARU Member-Society — the Bangladeshi government will once again issue ham licenses; exams will also be given on a monthly basis beginning August 13, 2008.

On July 21, representatives from BARL -- Belayet Robin, S21RB; Zahid Shipon, S21VA, and Saiful Huda, S21SH -- met with members of the Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) in what Robin called "a very fruitful meeting. BARL had finally been able to make the concerned authorities understand the significance of ham operators in a country with frequent natural disasters like floods and cyclones." BTRC Chairman Major General Manzurul Alam was present at the meeting, as were "almost all the senior officials, engineers and technical experts of the authorities," Robin said.

Robin, BARL's Assistant General Secretary, said that Alam "patiently listened" to the BARL team as they presented highlights of the activities of Bangladeshi Amateur Radio operators since BARL's origins in the late 1970s. In this two hour meeting, the BTRC and BARL agreed to resolve any problems arising from issues dealing with Amateur Radio, as well as promising to "promote ham radio as a scientific hobby in the country," Robin said.

The Bangladeshi government has only allowed ham radio operations since 1991, though amateurs have received special permission on a case-by-case basis to set up Emergency Communications infrastructures during natural disasters such as cyclones, tidal waves and flooding. BARL was formed in 1979 as a way to promote Amateur Radio, but on-air operations were banned due to the political climate of the region.

BARL will offer a class to prepare for the <u>exam</u>. Exams will be computer based with 35 multiple choice questions. In order to receive an Amateur Radio license, examinees must achieve 18 correct answers. Examinees are given one hour to complete the test.

BEAUTIFUL WAC AWARD EASY TO GET

On Friday, he ARRL Awards Branch unveiled a new design for two IARU award certificates: the Worked All Continents Award (WAC) and the 5 Band Worked All Continents Award (5BWAC). WAC is awarded to amateurs who have confirmed contacts on any band with Africa, Asia, Europe, South America, North America and Oceania, while 5BWAC recognizes hams who have made confirmed contacts with those continents on 10, 15, 20, 40 and 80 meters.

The WAC/5BWAC rules state that all contacts must be made from the same country or separate territory within the same continental area of the world. Contacts made on 10/18/24 MHz or via satellites are void for the 5-band certificate and 6-band endorsement. All contacts for the QRP endorsement must be made on or after January 1, 1985 while running a maximum power of 5 W output or 10 W input. US amateurs must be ARRL members to receive these awards; foreign amateurs must be members of their IARU Member-Society and should apply through their Member-Society.

According to ARRL DXCC Manager Bill Moore, NC1L, the WAC award -- originally announced in April 1926 issue of QST -- continues to be a popular award around the world with more than 6000 participants. "Besides the certificate design change, the WAC certificate will also display the award holder's name alongside their call sign. We do this already on the 5BWAC certificate."

Moore said there are a couple of ways that hams interested in applying for WAC or 5BWAC can do so. "They can download the <u>form</u> from the WAC Web site and send it via regular mail (along with QSL cards and payment) to ARRL, or DXCC recipients can send an <u>e-mail</u>, referring to their DXCC award. We can look into your account to verify the contacts; just include your payment information in your

message," he said.

WAC is currently not supported in ARRL's Logbook of The World (LoTW), but Moore said that an upgrade to do so is currently in the planning stages. Any comments or questions regarding the WAC or 5BWAC program should be referred to the WAC Desk.
